#### Changes in issues - Transport Sea Freight imports

In this issue the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) has changed the methodology for calculating transport sea freight imports by country. Formerly country allocation of sea freight imports were calculated based on sea freight direct commissions data as collected from the ABS Survey of International Trade in Services.

Country allocation is now determined using country of beneficial owner data as sourced from Bloomberg and the World Shipping Register. This is a more accurate reflection of international trade in sea freight, and has resulted in revisions from 2007 (source data prior to 2007 was unavailable or not fit for purpose). Because of this change in methodology, a trend break occurs for several countries between 2006 and 2007.

- Australia's exports and imports by all countries and selected country groups by DFAT's TRIEC at the 1-, 2-, 3- and 4-digit levels.

These two pivot tables are published on a calendar and financial year basis.

#### ii) Australia's direction of goods and services trade:

Time series spreadsheets covering Australia's trade in goods and services (exports, imports & two-way trade). Data on goods, services and goods and services is published for Australia's trading partners, as well as data by broad geographic groups and selected country groups.

The spreadsheets are published on a calendar year basis (back to 1987) and a financial year basis (back to 1986-87).

#### iii) <u>Historical trade and economic data</u>:

As part of a forthcoming product, *Australia's Trade Though Time* (ATTT), two spreadsheets are now available on the DFAT website. The first spreadsheet, *Australia's trade and economic indicators*, contains time series data for a range of trade and economic indicators back to 1901 (and for total merchandise trade back to 1826). The second time series spreadsheet, *Australia's direction of trade*, contains time series data for around 60 of Australia's major merchandise trading partners back to 1901 (and in some cases to 1885).

#### Introduction

The Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) publishes official statistics on Australia's trade in international services, compiled using international standards set out by the International Monetary Fund and the United Nations. The ABS publishes trade in services data on a monthly basis in the publication, *International Trade in Goods and Services, Australia* (catalogue 5368.0) and on a quarterly basis in the publication *Balance of Payments, Australia* (catalogue 5302.0). More detailed data is available upon request, although the amount of information (either published or unpublished) is limited, especially when compared with the wealth of data that is available on merchandise trade statistics.

The ABS and other Australian Government departments also publish other services-related data that can be used to provide a more detailed picture of Australia's trade in services with the world. Users need to keep in mind that such statistics are generally not directly compatible with the ABS reported trade in services statistics because they are not compiled within the framework established by international standards for balance of payment statistics.

This publication presents the detailed official ABS trade in services data as well as a range of other statistics that are available to users interested in Australia's trade in services.

#### Sections 1 to 5 – ABS statistics on Australia's trade in services

The first five sections provide the detailed official statistics on Australia's trade in services for the most recent periods, usually the past three years. Longer time-series data for Sections 1 to 5 are available from the ABS website (ABS catalogues <u>5302.0</u> or <u>5368.0</u>).

### Sections 6 to 9 – Other statistical collections that provide additional information on Australia's trade in services

Sections 6 to 9 present data on trade in services that are available from other sources. Information boxes have been provided to help users understand the differences between these statistics and those in Sections 1 to 5. Data have been sourced from: the ABS publications, Tourism Satellite Accounts (catalogue 5249.0); Overseas Arrivals and Departures (catalogue 3401.0); International Investment Position, Australia: Supplementary Statistics (catalogue. 5352.0); Department of Education and Training (DET) Student enrolment data; Department of Immigration and Border Protection (DIBP) Student visa data and Tourism Research Australia (TRA) International Visitors Survey.



#### Australia's trade in services – 2015<sup>1</sup>

#### Australia's trade in services





- The value of total trade in services increased 9.1 per cent to \$142.5 billion in 2015
  - since 2010, total trade values have increased by an average of 5.8 per cent per annum.
- Total trade in services accounted for 21.3 per cent of Australia's total trade in goods and services (up from 19.7 per cent in 2014).
- The balance of trade in services recorded a deficit of \$10.1 billion, down \$109 million from a \$10.3 billion deficit in 2014.

#### **Box A: Services trade definition**

The ABS defines services trade as comprising services provided between Australian residents and non-residents.<sup>2</sup> Services trade is classified by type of activity, covering *Manufacturing services on physical inputs owned by others, Maintenance & repair, Transport, Travel, Construction, Insurance & pension, Financial, Intellectual property charges, Telecommunications, computer & information, Other business, Personal, cultural & recreational and Government services.* For more details refer to *Appendix A – Explanatory notes*.

#### Australia's exports of services





- Australia's exports of services rose by 10.0 per cent to \$66.2 billion in 2015
  - since 2010, export values have increased by an average of 5.5 per cent per annum.
- Export volumes rose 8.3 per cent, while export prices rose 1.5 per cent
  - export volumes have increased by an average of 3.3 per cent per annum since 2010.
- Australia's exports of services accounted for 20.9 per cent of Australia's total exports (up from 18.4 per cent in 2014).
- However on a <u>trade in value-added basis</u> services account for around 40 per cent of total exports (see page 9 for more detail).

#### Australia's imports of services

- Australia's imports of services increased by 8.4 per cent to \$76.3 billion in 2015
  - import values have increased by an average of 6.1 per cent per annum since 2010.
- Import volumes decreased 1.1 per cent, while import prices rose 9.6 per cent
  - however, import volumes have increased by an average of 2.1 per cent per annum since 2010.
- Australia's imports of services accounted for 21.6 per cent of Australia's total imports (up from 20.9 per cent in 2014).

#### Box B: Services trade overview 2015

**Exports of services** rose 10.0 per cent (while in volume terms exports rose 8.3 per cent). Rises were recorded in *Education-related travel services*—up 10.4 per cent or \$1.8 billion; *Other personal (excluding education-related) travel services*—up 12.4 per cent or \$1.8 billion; *Telecommunications, computer & information services*—up 34.5 per cent or \$778 million and *Financial services*—up 18.8 per cent or \$597 million.


Partially offsetting these rises were falls in *Engineering services*—down 10.3 per cent or \$153 million and *Postal and courier services*—down 9.1 per cent or \$124 million.

**Imports of services** rose 8.4 per cent (but decreased 1.1 per cent in volume terms). Increases occurred in *Other personal (excluding education-related) travel services*—up 8.2 per cent or \$2.0 billion; *Professional & management consulting services*—up 24.2 per cent or \$1.2 billion, *Freight services*—up 4.9 per cent or \$472 million, *Financial services*—up 21.1 per cent or \$448 million and *Telecommunications, computer & information services*—up 14.5 per cent or \$428 million.

Partially offsetting these rises were falls in *Engineering services*—down 5.6 per cent or \$156 million and *Home entertainment audiovisual services*—down 42.9 per cent or \$106 million.


#### **Exports of Transport services**

- In 2015, exports of *Transport services* rose
   2.5 per cent to \$6.8 billion
  - in volume terms, exports increased
     1.0 per cent and prices rose 1.5 per cent.
- Exports of Transport services have risen by an average of 1.2 per cent per annum since 2010
- Within Transport services:
  - Passenger transport rose 9.4 per cent (or \$227 million) to \$2.6 billion;
  - Freight transport decreased 4.6 per cent (or \$13 million) to \$268 million;
  - Other transport rose 3.0 per cent (or \$76 million) to \$2.6 billion; and
  - Postal & courier services decreased
     9.1 per cent (or \$124 million) to
     \$1.2 billion.


#### **Imports of Transport services**

- Imports of *Transport services* increased
   6.1 per cent to \$17.7 billion in 2015
  - in volume terms, imports rose
     3.4 per cent while prices rose
     2.6 per cent.
- Since 2010, imports of Transport services have risen by an average of 3.6 per cent per annum.
- Within Transport services:
  - Passenger transport rose 5.4 per cent (or \$332 million) to \$6.5 billion;
  - Freight transport increased 4.9 per cent (or \$472 million) to \$10.2 billion;
  - Other transport rose 31.5 per cent (or \$225 million) to \$939 million; and
  - Postal & courier services decreased
     11.2 per cent (or \$13 million) to
     \$103 million.


#### **Exports of Travel services**

- In 2015, exports of *Travel services* increased 10.5 per cent to \$39.2 billion
  - in volume terms, exports rose 8.4 per cent while prices increased 1.9 per cent.
- Travel services exports have risen by an average of 4.7 per cent per annum since 2010.
- Within *Travel services*:
  - Business travel rose 4.9 per cent (or \$204 million) to \$4.4 billion;
  - Education-related travel services (Australia's largest services export) rose 10.4 per cent (or \$1.8 billion) to \$18.8 billion; and
  - Other personal (excluding educationrelated) travel rose 12.4 per cent (or \$1.8 billion) to \$15.9 billion.


#### Imports of Travel services

- Imports of Travel services increased
   6.9 per cent to \$31.3 billion in 2015
  - in volume terms, imports fell 3.4 per cent while prices increased 10.6 per cent.
- Since 2010, imports of *Travel services* have risen by an average of 4.7 per cent per annum.
- Within Travel services:
  - Business travel increased 0.8 per cent (or \$29 million) to \$3.4 billion;
  - Education-related travel fell 3.4 per cent (or \$40 million) to \$1.1 billion; and
  - Other personal (excluding educationrelated) travel (Australia's largest services import) rose 8.2 per cent (or \$2.0 billion) to \$26.7 billion.

- In 2015, exports of Other services increased
   11.5 per cent to \$20.2 billion
  - in volume terms, exports rose
     10.8 per cent while prices increased
     0.7 per cent.
- Exports of Other services have risen by an average 9.1 per cent per annum since 2010.
- Within Other services:
  - Professional & management consulting services increased 7.2 per cent (or \$350 million) to \$5.2 billion;
  - Technical, trade-related & other business services increased 3.1 per cent (or \$106 million) to \$3.5 billion;
  - Financial services increased 18.8 per cent (or \$597 million) to \$3.8 billion; and
  - Telecommunications, computer & information services rose 34.5 per cent (or \$778 million) to \$3.0 billion.


- Imports of Other services increased
   12.2 per cent to \$26.9 billion in 2015
  - in volume terms, imports fell 1.1 per cent while prices rose 13.5 per cent.
- Since 2010, imports of *Other services* have risen by an average 9.8 per cent per annum.
- Within Other services:
  - Technical, trade-related & other business services rose 4.7 per cent (or \$270 million) to \$6.1 billion;
  - Professional & management consulting services rose 24.2 per cent (or \$1.2 billion) to \$5.9 billion;
  - Intellectual property charges increased
     5.0 per cent (or \$222 million) to
     \$4.6 billion;
  - Telecommunications, computer & information services rose 14.5 per cent (or \$428 million) to \$3.4 billion.
  - Financial services rose 21.1 per cent (or \$448 million) to \$2.6 billion.

- The United States was Australia's largest two-way services trading partner in 2015, accounting for 16.1 per cent (\$22.9 billion) of total services trade, followed by the United Kingdom, accounting for 8.6 per cent (\$12.3 billion) and China, also accounting for 8.6 per cent (\$12.3 billion).
- APEC economies accounted for 59.4 per cent of total services trade.
- Exports of services to: the APEC region rose 11.8 per cent; ASEAN members increased 8.2 per cent; the European Union increased 5.5 per cent; G20 members rose 11.8 per cent and OECD countries increased 6.9 per cent.
- Services imports from: the APEC region rose 9.4 per cent; ASEAN members increased 3.3 per cent; the European Union increased 10.7 per cent; G20 members rose 10.5 per cent and OECD countries increased 11.1 per cent.











#### Global trade in services 2015<sup>6</sup>

- World exports of services were valued at US\$4.8 trillion<sup>7</sup> in 2015, down 6.1 per cent or US\$313.2 billion on 2014 levels.
- World exports of services accounted for 22.6 per cent of the world's total goods and services exports (up from 21.3 per cent in 2014).


#### Major services exporters




# Importance of Australian services industries to the Australian export sector

In some commentary, the low ratio of Australian services exports to total exports (less than 20 per cent since 2009 on a gross flow basis) compared with Australian services industries' proportion of GDP (around 70 per cent of GDP) is often used to imply that Australia's exports of services are much less than they could be, especially when compared with other similar countries.

Although Australia's geographic isolation makes it harder to deliver services compared to countries that border other nations, the gross flows measure still greatly underestimates the contribution of Australian services industries to Australian exports.

Because many services are not traded directly, services contributions to exports are more fully captured on a value-added basis. For instance land transport and electricity services used up in the mining and export of resources are reflected in trade on a value added basis. On a gross exports basis these values are inherent in the value of the resource and are not separately identified.

The chart below shows that in 2011 services exports accounted for only 16 per cent of gross exports, down from 22 per cent in 2005<sup>9</sup>. However the contribution of domestic services to gross exports of goods and services, measured by the OECD database on a Trade in Value Added (TIVA) basis, amounted to over 40 per cent (and remained relatively constant between 1995 and 2011).



To understand the full value of services provided abroad by Australian residents, those delivered by foreign affiliates abroad must also be taken into account. Neither the simple gross flows measure nor the trade in value-add measure capture services delivered in this manner. In many cases it is often necessary (or preferable) to set up an Australian affiliate in a host country to deliver services (e.g. construction services). The Australian Bureau of Statistics has found that up to two-thirds of Australia's services provided to non-residents are supplied in this manner. This is explored further in the article that follows.

#### Conclusion

Simply analysing gross services exports' contribution to gross exports overall significantly underestimates the importance of Australia's services industries to the Australian export sector. Using the value-added measure it can be shown that over 40 per cent of the value of exports overall are accounted for by Australia's domestic services industries. In addition around two-thirds of Australian services provided to the world are delivered by Australian foreign affiliates abroad, not via direct export.

#### Australia's foreign affiliates trade in services

Australia's trade in services statistics, as captured in Australia's Balance of Payments (BoP) statistics, do not cover services provided by an Australian commercial presence abroad, or services provided in Australia by a foreign-owned enterprise. Unlike goods trade, it is often necessary for a company to set up a commercial presence in the host country to provide the service (known as a foreign affiliate). The services provided by foreign affiliates are referred to as Foreign Affiliates Trade in Services.

According to the <u>UN World investment report 2016</u>, world sales from foreign affiliates (both goods and services) was valued at US\$36.7 trillion in 2015 (up US\$2.5 trillion from 2014) compared to exports from foreign affiliates valued at just US\$7.8 trillion.

A one-off study by the ABS in 2002-03 found that Foreign Affiliates Trade in Services was also significant for Australia, with nearly two-thirds of the provision of Australian services to the world being sourced from an Australian commercial presence abroad, valued at \$59.4 billion (or outwards Foreign Affiliates Trade in Services), compared to direct exports of around \$36 billion<sup>10</sup>. The ABS also conducted a one-off study of inwards Foreign Affiliates Trade in Services in 2000-01. It found that foreign-owned companies in the services sector (excluding finance and insurance) accounted for around 14 per cent of total gross value added for these industries, valued at \$35.5 billion. Operating income for the services industries (including financial and insurance industry) was valued at \$189.2 billion, compared to imports of services into Australia of around \$34 billion)<sup>11</sup>.

Three later studies showed that the level of Australian foreign affiliate activity with the world can vary significantly across service sectors.

#### Legal services

A study on the Australian legal services markets conducted by the Law Council of Australia for 2010-11 found that Australia's provision of legal services to the world was valued at \$784.5 million in 2010-11. Services exported directly from Australia were valued at \$643.9 million while legal services to the world via a foreign affiliate (commercial presence) were valued at \$140.7 million.

#### Financial and Insurance services

The Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT) commissioned the ABS to conduct a survey of outward foreign affiliates trade in services for the finance and insurance sector for the reference period 2009-10. This survey found that Australia's 1,245 finance and insurance affiliates located abroad had sales of financial and insurance services valued at \$38.9 billion in 2009-10<sup>12</sup>. This compared with exports from Australia of these services valued at only \$1.4 billion. The survey found that commercial presence was critical in the provision of Australian financial and insurance services abroad 13.

#### Education services

A 2015 report commissioned by the Department of Education and Training, *The value of international education to Australia*, found that revenue from Australian institutions offshore campuses was not a significant component of Australian provision of education services to the world. Revenue from offshore campuses was estimated to be worth \$434 million in 2014, compared to exports of education services valued at \$17.6 billion. However in terms of student numbers offshore, delivery of education on offshore campuses was a significant component with about one quarter of all international students studying at Australian education institutions located offshore <sup>14</sup>.



Although the ABS does not produce regular statistics on Australia's Foreign Affiliates Trade in Services, the annual ABS data on international direct investment by industry <sup>15</sup> can be used as an indicator of Australian Foreign Affiliates Trade in Services activity.

#### Australian direct investment abroad in the services sector<sup>16</sup>

Australian direct investment abroad by the industry can be used as an indicator of which services industries are important for Australia in terms of its outwards Foreign Affiliates Trade in Services. The level (or stock) of Australian direct investment abroad in the services sector 17 was valued at around \$220.1 billion in 2015 18 and accounted for around 41 per cent of Australian total direct investment abroad. The largest services sector was *Finance & insurance* with the Australian stock of direct investment valued at \$170.5 billion in 2015 (up \$15.8 billion from 2014). This was followed by *Real estate activities* sector with direct investment stock valued at \$13.0 billion in 2015 (up \$692 million from 2014) and *Construction* valued at \$9.1 billion (down \$1.8 billion from 2014). The stock of Australian direct investment abroad in the *Human health & social work activities* sector was valued at \$5.9 billion in 2015, while the stock of direct investment in the *Wholesale & retail* sector was valued at \$5.8 billion.



The income earned on direct investment abroad can be used as a proxy for the sales of Australian affiliates abroad. Due to confidentiality in ABS investment statistics, only a limited analysis can be done on income earned on Australian direct investment abroad for selected services industries.

In 2015, total income earned on Australian direct investment abroad for the services sector was valued at \$14.7 billion (up \$3.1 billion or 26.9 per cent on 2014). Income earned on Australian direct investment abroad in the *Finance & insurance* sector was valued at \$6.7 billion (up \$1.0 billion), which was for the first time above its previous peak of \$6.3 billion in 2008.




Income earned on Australian direct investment abroad in the *Construction* sector was valued at \$764 million (up \$157 million) in 2015, the *Human health & social work activities* sector was \$581 million, while income earned in the *Transport & Storage* sector was valued at \$223 million (up from \$-45 million in 2014)<sup>19</sup>.



#### Foreign direct investment in Australia in the services sector

Direct foreign investment in Australia by industry can be used as an indicator of which services industries are important for Australia in terms of its inwards Foreign Affiliates Trade in Services. The stock of foreign direct investment in Australia in the services sector was valued at \$352.9 billion in 2015 and accounted for 48.0 per cent of total foreign direct investment in Australia. The stock of direct investment in the services sector rose \$30.3 billion or 9.4 per cent in 2015.

The largest services sector was *Real estate activities* with the stock of foreign direct investment in Australia valued at \$64.0 billion in 2014 (up \$17.2 billion from 2014). This was followed by *Finance & insurance* with direct investment stock valued at \$59.6 billion in 2015 (up \$10.1 billion in 2014), *Wholesale & retail trade* valued at \$52.4 billion in 2015 (down \$6.3 billion in 2014), and *Information & communication* valued at \$25.0 billion (up \$378 million).



The income payable on direct investment in Australia can be used as a proxy for the sales of foreign affiliates in Australia. Due to confidentiality in ABS investment statistics, only a limited analysis can be done on income payable on foreign direct investment in Australia for selected services industries.

In 2015, total income payable on foreign direct investment in Australia for the services sector was valued at \$19.8 billion (up \$3.3 billion or 19.9 per cent on 2014).

The major services sectors included *Real estate activities* with income payable of \$5.1 billion in 2015 (up \$2.3 billion from 2014), *Finance & insurance* valued at \$4.8 billion (down \$467 million), *Wholesale & retail trade* valued at \$2.5 billion (up \$251 million), *Information & communication* valued at \$1.3 billion (up \$550 million) and *Construction services* valued at \$1.2 billion (down \$14 million).



## Measuring the performance of Australian Foreign Affiliates Trade in Services activity

The income yields on both income payable and income earned for all services industries can be used as an overarching indicator of the performance of Australia's Foreign Affiliates Trade in Services. The income yield is calculated as the income earned/payable on direct investment divided by the stock of direct investment. An increasing yield indicates improved performance, while a decreasing yield indicates a fall in performance.


In 2015, both Australia's inwards and outwards Foreign Affiliates Trade in Services activity performance improved. For Australia's outward Foreign Affiliates Trade in Services the income yield rose from 5.7 per cent in 2014 to 6.7 per cent in 2015. The 2015 yield is above the five-year average of 6.3 per cent and close to the pre-GFC rate of 6.8 per cent.

In terms of Australia's inwards Foreign Affiliates Trade in Services activity, the overall income yield rose from 5.1 per cent in 2014 to 5.6 per cent in 2015. This was slightly below the five-year average yield of 5.8 per cent but still well below the pre-GFC rate of over 8.0 per cent.

Due to confidentiality in ABS investment statistics, only a limited analysis can be done on income yields at the services industry level.

In terms of outwards Foreign Affiliates Trade in Services, the *Finance & insurance* sector, income yield was 3.9 per cent in 2015, up from 3.7 per cent in 2014 (close to the average yield for the last five-year average of 4.1 per cent) but still below the pre-Global Financial Crisis (GFC) peak of 7.7 per cent in 2008. Income yields for the *Construction* sector was 8.4 per cent in 2015, up from 5.6 per cent in 2014, for *Human health & social work activities* sector was 9.8 per cent and for *Transport & Storage* was 5.5 per cent (up from -1.5 per cent in 2014).

In terms of inwards Foreign Affiliates Trade in Services activity, in 2015, the overall income yield was 8.0 per cent for *Real estate activities* (up from 6.1 per cent in 2014), 8.1 per cent for *Finance & insurance* (down from 10.7 per cent in 2014), 4.8 per cent for *Wholesale & retail trade*, (up from 3.8 per cent in 2014), and 5.0 per cent for *Information & communication* (up from 2.9 per cent in 2014). The income yield for *Professional, scientific & technical activities* was 3.3 per cent in 2015 (down from 8.0 per cent in 2014) and well below the average rate for the last five years of 10.7 per cent.

As an example, *Attachment A* to this article uses United States Foreign Affiliates Trade in Services data to analyse trends in the United States Foreign Affiliates Trade in Services with Australia.

It is planned to update this analysis on an annual basis. The next update with 2016 data is planned to be published in August 2017.

# Attachment A – United States foreign affiliates trade in services with Australia

#### **Summary**

The United States is Australia's most important services trading partner. Trade in services has grown steadily over the past 20 years with the services trade relationship being further enhanced through the Australia/United States Free Trade Agreement. Though trade declined sharply during the GFC, it has recovered strongly over the past few years and in most areas has now exceeded the peaks reached before the GFC.

Services delivered by Australian affiliates in the United States and United States affiliates in Australia are the key mode for the provision and purchases of services between Australia and the United States. Services provided by foreign affiliates accounted for over 70 per cent of the provision and purchases of services between Australia and the United States.

The United States' <u>Bureau of Economic Analysis</u> (BEA) compiles and publishes data on United States foreign affiliates' trade with the world, both inwards and outwards. This data can be used to analyse trends in the United States Foreign Affiliates Trade in Services (FATS) with Australia. The latest data published by the BEA is for the calendar year 2013.

#### United States outwards foreign affiliates trade in services with Australia, 2013

The United States had 842 majority-owned foreign affiliates in Australia in 2013<sup>20</sup> – refer to *Table 1*. These affiliates had total assets in Australia of US\$571.8 billion. The gross value added by these affiliates was worth US\$46.8 billion in 2013. The affiliates had sales of goods and services in Australia valued at US\$183.8 billion, of which sales of services were valued at US\$52.6 billion in 2013. The affiliates employed 309,700 persons and paid wages and salaries (compensation of employees) valued at US\$27.1 billion during 2013.

The sales of services by United States affiliates in Australia have grown on average by 8.1 per cent per annum from US\$30.2 billion in 2006 to US\$52.6 billion in 2013, compared to United States exports of services to Australia, which have grown on average by 11.5 per cent per annum to US\$19.5 billion in 2013. Sales by United States affiliates in Australia accounted for 73.0 per cent of the total provision of services to Australia from the United States in 2013 (down from 76.8 per cent in 2006) – refer to **Table 2**.


Growth in sales of services by United States affiliates in Australia accounted for 68.4 per cent of the total growth in the provision of United States services to Australia between 2006 and 2013.

Sales of services by United States *Professional, scientific & technical services* affiliates in Australia accounted for the largest share of total services sales valued at US\$14.1 billion in 2013 (up from US\$4.9 billion in 2006) – refer to *Table 3*. This was followed by *Finance & insurance* affiliates with sales of services valued at US\$9.8 billion (up from US\$6.1 billion in 2006), *Wholesale & retail trade* with sales valued at US\$8.6 billion (up from US\$6.2 billion in 2006) and *Information* affiliates with sales valued at US\$7.6 billion (up from US\$5.7 billion in 2006).

#### United States inwards foreign affiliates trade in services with Australia, 2013

Australia had 112 majority-owned affiliates in the United States in 2013<sup>21</sup> – refer to *Table 4*. These affiliates had total assets in the United States of US\$268.5 billion. The gross value added by these affiliates was worth US\$15.7 billion in 2013. The affiliates had sales of goods and services in the United States valued at US\$58.3 billion, of which sales of services were valued at US\$22.9 billion in 2013. The affiliates employed 91,100 persons and paid wages and salaries (compensation of employees) valued at US\$8.1 billion during 2013.

The sales of services by Australian affiliates in the United States have grown on average by 16.8 per cent per annum from US\$7.4 billion in 2006 to US\$22.9 billion in 2013, compared to United States imports of services from Australia which have grown on average by 6.0 per cent per annum to US\$6.9 billion in 2013. Sales by Australian affiliates in the United States accounted for 76.9 per cent share of the total purchases of services from Australia by the United States (up from 62.1 per cent in 2006) – refer to *Table 2*.

Growth in sales of services by Australian affiliates in the United States accounted for 87.0 per cent of the total growth in purchases of services from Australia by the United States between 2006 and 2013.

Sales of services by Australian *Finance & insurance* affiliates in the United States accounted for the largest share of total services sales valued at US\$10.9 billion in 2013 (up from just US\$624 million in 2006) representing average annual growth of 50.0 per cent. – refer to *Table 5*. This was followed by sales of *Real estate, rental & leasing* affiliates with sales valued at around US\$4 billion (data was confidential in 2013, but was valued at US\$3.6 billion in 2013) and *Professional, scientific & technical services* affiliates with sales valued at US\$2.6 billion (up from US\$1.5 billion in 2006). Note a significant amount of data for Australia affiliates by industry is not published by the BEA (valued at US\$8.4 billion, in 2013).

## Section 6 Travel-related trade statistics

#### DIFFERENCES BETWEEN TOURISM SATELLITE ACCOUNT (TSA) AND TRAVEL SERVICES

- Tourism is not an industry or product in international statistical standards but it is commonly
  considered an industry by tourism researchers and economic analysts.
- The TSA measures the consumption of goods and services by the tourism industry, with an aim to measure the direct contribution to the Australian economy of the tourism industry.
- The TSA defines tourism consumption to include all travellers who stay in the host economy for less than one year, regardless of their purpose for travel (such as business, education, health and recreational purposes). As such the TSA definition of exports and imports of tourism is much broader than the general understanding of tourism services, i.e. covering just recreational travellers.
- It is not possible to calculate exactly the TSA measure of tourism exports and imports (which can be considered to be an industry view) from the ABS Extended Balance of Payments (EBOP) services classification (which is a commodity or product based classification or a commodity view) as used in the rest of this publication. The major difference being that the *Travel services* item in the EBOP classification includes all students who are studying in Australia (including those who stay for more than one year).
- The TSA definition would include all or part of the following services "commodities" from the EBOP trade in services classification: Passenger air and sea transportation services and related agency fees and commissions; Travel services (including business travel, education-related travel and other personal travel) as well as imputed services which are not measured in the EBOP classification, such as goods provided to visitors in private households.
- Therefore users should be careful when using both the TSA definition of exports and imports of tourism services in combination with the EBOP trade in services classification (for example to rank service exports) to ensure that they do not double count particular services items, such as education services.
- For more information refer to the ABS publications: *Tourism Satellite Accounts* (catalogue 5249.0) and the *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position Concepts Sources and Methods* (catalogue 5331.0).
- The TSA for 2015-16 is expected to be released by the ABS in December 2016.





#### **DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION AND TRAINING - STUDENT DATA**

- The Department of Education and Training produces monthly data on international student enrolments in Australia for students on a student visa. Excluded from these statistics are students on tourist visas who undertake short courses, particularly in the ELICOS (English Language Intensive Courses for Overseas Students) sector.
- Data includes enrolment by all sectors schools, vocational education, higher education, and ELICOS. Country of origin is based on citizenship, rather than permanent home residence.
- The Department of Education and Training <u>student enrolment data does not represent the number of overseas students in Australia</u>. Instead the data counts actual course enrolments. A student attending two different courses (e.g. ELICOS and a Bachelor degree) will have both enrolments counted. Students are counted as being enrolled, even if they temporarily leave the country (e.g. end of year holidays).
- The Department of Education and Training separately estimates the numbers of overseas students in Australia by country on a calendar year basis only (refer to table below).
- Students from New Zealand are not captured in either the enrolment and student number data as they do not require a student visa to study in Australia.



#### DEPARTMENT OF IMMIGRATION AND BORDER PROTECTION STUDENT VISA DATA

- The Department of Immigration and Border Protection (DIBP) produces a quarterly report on the International student visa program. The report provides data on the number of student visas lodged, granted, processing time for visa and the total number of students in Australia on a student visa.
- Student visa data also includes accompanying family members. Students from New Zealand are not captured in this data as they do not require a student visa to study in Australia.
- The trends in the student visa data (both lodged and granted) published by DIBP can be used as a
  forward indicator of the likely trends that will be observed in the value of exports of Educationrelated travel services over the next year.
- It should be noted that recent movements in student visa numbers can be expected to take time to flow through to the overall stock of international students in Australia, especially for the Higher education sector (with students studying for a number of years). This will, in turn, delay the flow-on effect to the overall value of *Education-related travel services*.

# Direct investment in services industries

#### **AUSTRALIA'S FOREIGN AFFILIATES SERVICES TRADE**

- The ABS does not regularly collect data on trade in services from Australian foreign affiliates abroad and foreign affiliates located in Australia. However, ABS international investment statistics can be used to measure the level of foreign direct investment in Australian service industries as well as Australian direct investment in services industries abroad. This data, along with associated income flows, provides a broad indicator of the size of this activity.
- For further information regarding Australia's foreign affiliates trade the ABS has published a
  number of one-off studies into this activity. For Australia's inward foreign affiliates trade, refer to
  the ABS publication, *Economic Activity of Foreign Owned Businesses in Australia 2000-01*(catalogue 5494.0) and for Australia's outward foreign affiliates trade refer to the ABS publication, *Australian Outward Foreign Affiliates Trade 2002-03* (catalogue 5495.0).



#### Stock of foreign direct investment in Australia, 2015







### **Technical appendices**

## Appendix A Explanatory notes

#### Introduction

This publication describes Australia's international trade in services by partner country and by type of service as well as international comparisons of services trade.

**Section 1** shows *Summary data on Australia's trade in goods and services*—values are given in both current and chain volume measures and related Implicit Price Deflators (IPDs).

**Section 2**, Australia's services trade by type of activity, shows the lowest level of data available for the period based on the ABS Extended Balance of Payments (EBOP) services classification (see classifications for more details).

**Section 3 & 4**, *Australia's services trade by country and country group*, shows data for 39 countries and selected country groups. Services trade is split by major service category. A further country breakdown by services commodities for the period 2011 to 2015 is also included for those countries with around or above \$1.0 billion worth of services trade with Australia. Ranking tables are also included.

**Section 5**, Services trade by State & Territory, shows Australia's international trade in services split by State and Territory.

**Sections 6 & 7**, *Travel-related* and *Education-related statistics*, shows data on travel services that are available from other sources. Information boxes have been provided to help users understand the differences between these statistics and those in Sections 1 to 4. Data has been sourced from the ABS publications Tourism Satellite Accounts (catalogue 5249.0) and Overseas Arrivals and Departures (catalogue 3401.0); Department of Education, Employment and Workplace Relations—Australian Education International (AEI) Student enrolment data; Department of Immigration and Border Protection (DIBP) Student visa data and Tourism Research Australia (TRA) International Visitors Survey.

**Section 8,** *Information, communication and technology (ICT) statistics*, shows data on ICT goods and services trade by type of ICT good and service and by major exports destinations and import sources.

**Section 9**, *Direct investment in service industries*, shows data on Australia's direct investment levels by broad industry division as well as associated income flows. In this publication the service industries are defined as: electricity, gas and water; construction; wholesale & retail trade; accommodation, cafes & restaurants; transport & communications; finance & insurance; property and business services; and other services.

**Section 10**, *Global trade in services*, compares Australia's exports and imports of services with major countries, split by transport, travel and other services, and services sector as a percentage of GDP.

Percentage shares, year-on-year per cent changes and average five year trend growth are provided in each table where appropriate.

Global trade in services data is presented under the IMF Balance of Payments (BOP) standard presentation. This view shows trade in services by its standard components under BPM6.

#### **Definitions**

#### Services

Australia's BOP defines services as comprising services provided between Australian residents and non-residents, together with some transactions in goods where, by international agreement, it is not practicable to separate the goods and services components (e.g. goods purchased by travellers are classified as services).

Services delivered to non-residents through a foreign branch or subsidiary, for example, services rendered to an Asian company by a branch office of an Australian legal firm in Bangkok, are not defined as a BOP transaction. But services delivered by a parent company to a foreign-resident subsidiary are defined as international services. Any profits or dividends remitted between an enterprise in Australia and a related enterprise abroad are regarded as an income transaction, not as a service.

Australia's BOP statistics are compiled in accordance with the latest international standards determined by the International Monetary Fund, and published in *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position Manual*, sixth edition, 2008 (BPM6).

International BOP statistics are also compiled in accordance with the standards determined by the International Monetary Fund, and published in BPM6. These standards have been used for Section 10 in this publication.

#### Classifications

#### Services - BPM6

The ABS EBOP services classification is based on the UN publication *Manual on Statistics of International Trade in Services*, *2010*. This is an extended services classification that is fully compatible with the BPM6. Services commodities are broken down into 12 major groups and around 90 detailed services commodities.

#### Manufacturing services on physical inputs owned by others nie

Manufacturing services on physical inputs owned by others covers processing, assembly, labelling, packing etc undertaken by enterprises that do not own the goods concerned.

#### Maintenance & repair services nie

Maintenance & repair services covers maintenance and repairs by residents on goods owned by non-residents (and vice versa). Repairs and maintenance on ships, aircraft and other transport equipment are included in this item. Cleaning of transport equipment is excluded as it is included in *Other transport services*. Construction maintenance and repairs are included in *Construction services*, while maintenance and repairs of computers are included in *Computer services*.

#### **Transport services**

*Transport services* covers services provided by residents of one economy to those of another economy that involve the carriage of passengers, the movement of goods, and related supporting and auxiliary services. Also included are postal & courier services.

Transport is broken down into passenger services, freight services, other transport services and postal & courier services. While the international standards call for a dissection of transport services by mode of transport (sea/air/other), in Australia confidentiality constraints preclude the presentation of data at this level of detail.

Passenger services covers the transport of people. It excludes cruise fares which are included in travel services.

Freight services covers the transport of all other objects other than people. It includes freight between overseas ports.

Other transport services includes services that are auxiliary to transport. It includes cargo handling, storage and warehousing, packing and repacking, baggage handling, pilotage and navigation charges, air traffic control, cleaning performed in ports, salvage operations and agents fees associated with passenger and freight transport.

Postal & courier services covers the pick-up, transport and delivery of letters parcels and packages between residents and non-residents.

#### **Travel services**

*Travel services* covers all goods and services acquired for personal use in an economy by travellers and foreign workers. A traveller is defined as an individual who stays for less than one year in a country where he or she is not a resident. There are some exceptions to this definition:

- (i) foreign government officials (and accompanying dependants) employed abroad, such as diplomatic and military personnel stationed at a military base or at an embassy, high commission or consulate, are not considered travellers. Expenditures of these individuals in foreign economies are included in *Government services nie* rather than travel;
- (ii) persons who are employed in another economy for less than one year are also regarded not as travellers but as foreign workers. However, any personal expenditure they incur is included in travel; and
- (iii) the one-year rule does not apply to students and medical patients; they remain residents of their economies of origin even if their length of stay in another economy is one year or more, provided they are regarded as still having their centre of economic interest in the country of origin.

Travel is broken down into two components, *Business travel* and *Personal travel*. *Personal travel* is further broken down into *Education-related* travel and *other personal* travel. *Education-related travel* also includes tuition fees while *Other personal travel* also includes health-related travel and cruise fares.

#### **Construction services**

Construction services covers work on construction projects and installations by construction enterprises in locations outside the economic territory of the enterprise.

BPM6 recommends that the purchase of a building is a construction service. The ABS did not implement this recommendation – purchases of buildings remain in the financial account in ABS BOP statistics.

#### Insurance & pension services

Insurance services covers the provision of various types of insurance to non-residents by resident insurance companies, and vice versa. It includes freight insurance (on goods being exported or imported); other types of direct insurance (i.e. life, accident, health, general liability, fire, marine, aviation etc); and reinsurance. Also included are agents' commissions related to insurance transactions.

Pension services are explicit or implicit fees and charges for pension schemes between residents and non-residents. Pensions may be provided by social security schemes or employer-related schemes.

#### **Financial services**

Financial services covers financial intermediary and auxiliary services conducted between residents and non-residents. Included are intermediary service fees, such as those associated with letters of credit, bankers' acceptances, lines of credit, financial leasing and foreign exchange transactions; commissions and other fees related to transactions in securities; commissions of commodity futures traders; services related to asset management, financial market operational and regulatory services; and security custody fees.

*Financial services* also includes Financial Intermediation Services Indirectly Measured (FISIM) which estimate the value of the services provided by financial intermediaries for which no explicit charges are made.

The ABS has not included margins on buying and selling in the compilation of Australia's financial services trade. ABS research concluded that for Australia these transactions were not significant at this stage.

#### Charges for the use of intellectual property nie

Charges for the use of intellectual property covers the exchange of payments and receipts between residents and non-residents for the authorised use of intangible, non-produced, non-financial assets and proprietary rights, and the use, through licensing agreements, of produced originals such as manuscripts or films. It includes the use of: patents, industrial designs, industrial know-how, manufacturing rights and prototypes; trademarks and franchising fees; computer software; computer design and hardware; and other royalties. Distribution and licence fees sold to

the media for a limited number of showings in specified areas for films, television programs, videos, multimedia and music are included in *Personal*, *cultural* & *recreational services*.

#### Telecommunication, computer & information services

Telecommunication services encompasses the broadcast of transmission of sound, images, data or other information by telephone, radio and television cable and satellite. It does not include the value of the information being transported. Also included are mobile telecommunications, internet backbone services and online access services, including provision of access to the internet. Excluded are installation services for telephone networks equipment (included in construction services) and database services (included in information services).

Computer & information services covers computer data service and news-related service transactions between residents and non-residents. Included are: database services, such as development, storage, and on-line time series; data processing, including tabulation, provision of processing services, and management of facilities of others on a continuing basis; hardware consultancy; software implementation, including design, development and programming of customised systems; maintenance and repair of computers and peripheral equipment; news agency services, including provision of news, photographs and feature articles to the media; and direct, non-bulk subscriptions to newspapers and periodicals.

#### Other business services

Other business services covers various categories, other than those elsewhere defined, of service transactions between residents and non-residents. Other business services are split into three broad categories: Research & development services; Professional & management consulting services; and Technical, trade-related & other business services.

Research & development services covers those services transacted between residents and non-residents that are associated with research and experimental development of new products and processes.

Professional & management consulting services includes:

- Legal services covers legal advisory and representation services in law, judicial and statutory procedures; drafting services of legal documentation and instruments; certification consultancy; auctioning services and escrow and settlement services;
- Accounting & audit services covers the recording of commercial transactions for businesses and others;
   examination of accounting records and financial statements; business tax planning and consulting; and preparation of tax documents, as well as general bookkeeping services;
- Business & management consultancy covers advisory, guidance and operational assistance services provided to businesses for business policy and strategy and overall planning, structure and control of an organisation;
- Management fees nie covers payments for management services to their parent companies representing
  contributions to their general management costs that cannot be further defined. This is not a BPM6 item,
  however the ABS has included this item as research found that some companies were unable to split these
  expenses to their appropriate services type; and
- Advertising, market research & public polling services covers the design, creation, and marketing of
  advertisements by advertising agencies; media placement, including purchase and sale of advertising space;
  exhibition services provided by trade fairs; the promotion of products; market research; and public opinion
  polling.

Technical, trade-related & other business services includes:

- Architectural services covers transactions relating to architectural design and development projects; planning, project design consultancy and supervision;
- Engineering services covers transactions of services incidental to engineering for development projects, planning, project design, consultancy and supervision;
- Surveying services covers services incidental to surveying of projects;
- Scientific & other technical services covers transactions of services in scientific and technical projects not further categorised;
- Waste treatment & de-pollution services covers treatment of radio-active waste, stripping contaminated soil, cleaning up pollution and decontamination services and sanitation;

- Services incidental to agriculture; forestry & fishing covers services incidental to agriculture (including
  providing agricultural machinery with crew, harvesting, treatment of crops, pest control, animal boarding care
  and breeding services), hunting, trapping, forestry, logging and fishing;
- Services incidental to mining, oil & gas extraction covers services rendered at oil and gas fields, services
  incidental to mineral prospecting and exploration and geological survey;
- Other on-site processing services covers maintenance and repair of machinery and on-site processing and treatment of any kind of product that is not subsequently exported from the processing economy;
- Trade related services covers commissions on goods and services transactions on items the trader does not own; and
- Other business services covers those business services transactions not covered in any other category.

#### Personal, cultural & recreational services

Personal, cultural & recreational services (involving transactions between residents and non-residents) includes audio-visual & related services and other personal, cultural & recreational services.

The first category covers: services related to the production of motion pictures, radio and television programs, and musical recordings; fees to actors, producers, directors etc; distribution and licence fees for films, television programs, videos, multimedia and music sold to the media for limited showings in specified areas; sports event promotion, organisation and sponsorship including payments to athletes; and performance, presentation and promotion services relating to performing arts and other live entertainment events.

The other category covers fees for the provision of correspondence courses, services rendered abroad by teachers or doctors; and all other personal services including veterinary, social and welfare services; cultural services such as those associated with museums, libraries and archives; and other sporting and recreational activities.

The ABS compiles these statistics from information supplied by companies in various surveys. It should be noted that the coverage of entertainment and cultural services exports and related royalties may be deficient because receipts received directly by Australian resident individuals are not covered in data collection.

#### Government services nie

Government services nie is a residual category covering government service transactions for goods and services (office supplies, furnishings, utilities, official vehicles and their operation and maintenance, and official entertainment) by embassies, consulates, military units and defence agencies, and personal expenditures incurred by diplomats, consular and military staff and their dependants in the economies in which they are located. Also included are transactions associated with general administrative expenditures, etc. and not included elsewhere.

For more information concerning the definitions and classification used by the ABS in the compilation of its services statistics, please refer to the ABS publication: *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia, Concepts Sources and Methods 1998* (catalogue 5331.0). The ABS is planning to update this publication to include BPM6 concepts. Until this publication is updated, please refer to the following ABS Information Paper – *Implementation of new international standards in ABS National and International Accounts, September 2009* (catalogue 5310.0 55.002).

#### Series break in ABS trade in services data

#### Introduction of BPM6

With the collection of trade in services on a *Balance of Payments Manual*, Sixth edition, 2008 basis (BPM6) the ABS took the opportunity to increase the number of lines available for respondents to report country data in the Survey of International Trade in Services. This improved the quality of regional trade in services data and has helped reduce the size of trade in services allocated to the 'Other countries' category from this date.

#### **Travel services**

The Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) has undertaken a rebuild of its Overseas Arrivals and Departures (OAD) system. As a result the ABS revised the OAD data back to July 2004.

The revised OAD data was incorporated into ABS travel services data (exports and imports) in the February 2014 release of its publication International Trade in Goods and Services, Australia (ABS catalogue 5368.0). However because of ABS policy revisions to travel services, these revisions have been applied back to July 2010 only. <u>As a result a time series break exists in the travel services data from July 2010 in this publication.</u>

#### SITS frame improvements

With the continual improvement in the ABS Survey of International Trade in Services (SITS) frames and coverage, users should be aware that movements in business services between 2013 and 2014 may be due in part, to improved frame coverage rather than an actual increase/decrease in trade.

The ABS will, where appropriate, revise historical data identified from improved coverage in accordance with ABS macroeconomic revisions standards.

#### **Broad trade sector definitions**

Trade by broad sector used in *Tables 2 and 3* in this publication are based on the ABS BOP classification for goods and services trade.

For exports, the broad sectors are defined as:

Rural goods – includes meat, cereal grains, wool and other rural goods (but excludes wine).

*Minerals & fuels* – includes metal ores and minerals (such as iron ore) and mineral fuels (such as coal, natural gas and petroleum).

*Manufactures* – includes metals (excluding gold), machinery, transport equipment and other manufactured goods.

**Other goods** – includes beverages (including wine and beer) and confidential trade items (including sugar), gold, goods procured in ports by carriers and net exports of goods under merchanting.

Gold - includes non-monetary gold.

Services – refer to services classification for details.

For imports, the broad sectors are defined as:

**Consumption goods** – includes food and beverage (mainly for consumption), household electrical items, non-industrial transport equipment, textiles, clothing and footwear, toys, books and leisure goods and other consumption goods.

**Capital goods** – includes machinery and industrial equipment, ADP equipment, telecommunications equipment, civil aircraft, industrial transport equipment and other capital goods.

**Intermediate and Other merchandise goods** – includes food and beverages (mainly for industry), primary industrial supplies, fuels and lubricants, parts for transportation and ADP equipment and other capital goods, chemicals, paper and paper board, textile yarn and fabric, iron and steel, plastics and processed industrial supplies. Other goods include goods procured in ports by carriers.

Gold – includes non-monetary gold.

Services - refer to services classification for details.

#### **Industry classification**

The industry classification used in *Tables 68 to 73* in this publication are based on the Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification 2006 (ANZSIC06). An individual business entity is assigned to an industry based on its predominant activity.

In this publication the industry divisions are presented based on the OECD specifications, not as those presented at the division level of the ANZSIC06 classification. The service sector is defined as all industries excluding *Agriculture forestry & fishing, Mining & quarrying* and *Manufacturing*.

The industry of the direct investor represents the main activity of the top enterprise in Australia. As a result users should be aware that, Australian direct investment abroad by industry division represents the industry of the top enterprise in Australia not the industry of the affiliate abroad.

#### **ABS Chain volume measures**

Estimates of 'real' growth are compiled by the ABS, using chain volume measures. Chain volume measures are derived by deflating the original current price series by specifically compiled measures of price change. The reference year for chain volume measures is the year prior to the latest complete financial year incorporated into the publication. The reference year is updated with the completion of estimates for each financial year.

Prior to the reference year, chain volume measures are not additive, in that the component chain volume measures of an aggregate will not add through to the chain volume measure of the total aggregate. For further information on chain volume measures refer to the ABS publication: *Information paper, Australian National Accounts, Introduction of Chain Volume and Price Indexes* (catalogue 5248.0).

#### Country

**Tables 9 to 27** of Sections 3 and 4 present data on Australia's services trade by type for 39 countries and selected country groups.

Some care should also be exercised whenever analysing specific country or country groups. A proportion of services trade cannot be allocated to a specific country, or country group, because the data source used to compile trade in services statistics (administrative by product or survey respondent) is unable to provide the country.

Considerable care should be exercised in comparing international statistics—although countries generally follow international recommendations for the compilation of *Balance of Payments* statistics, differences still occur in concepts, sources and collection methods.

For the European Union, services data before and including 2004 includes only the European Union 15 countries. Services data from 2005 to December 2006 includes data for the European Union 25, from January 2007 onwards to August 2013 includes data for the European Union 27. From September 2013 includes data for the European Union 28 (see *Appendix C* for more details).

#### Implications of G20 membership for data analysis

Users should exercise care in interpreting the data. Particular care should be taken as France, Germany, Italy and the United Kingdom are members of the G20 and also the EU28. Accordingly, there is a danger of double-counting data from these members. As such the G20 total in the data tables is not the sum of each of the members' data as this will constitute double-counting of France, Germany, Italy and the United Kingdom. The G20 total is the sum of the EU28 plus other members (excepting France, Germany, Italy and the United Kingdom).

#### State services trade data

Services exports are classified by the State of provision, while services imports are classified by the State of consumption.

*Transport services* are allocated by State using a combination of indicators including merchandise trade statistics by State and short-term overseas passenger arrivals and departures by State of clearance.

Overseas passenger departures data by the State where most time was spent are used to allocate the business and personal travel components of travel credits. *Education-related travel* exports are split using State data provided by the Department of Education, Employment and Workplace Relations. *Travel* imports are split using overseas departures data for resident departures by State of residency.

For *Telecommunication* and *Postal services*, an indicator for allocating the consumption of these services by State in the national accounts is used to approximate the State allocation for the international trade in these services. It is assumed that each State's share of outgoing international calls and terminating connections for incoming international calls will be reasonably well aligned with total service consumption by State or Territory.

All other services are primarily based on the location of the business reporting the information, which serves as a proxy for the State of provision/consumption of that service.

The ABS does not compile State and Territory services data by partner country.

#### Overseas arrivals and departures

Overseas arrivals and departures (OAD) refer to the arrival or departure of Australian residents and overseas visitors, through Australian airports (or sea ports) which have been recorded on Department of Immigration and Border Protection (DIBP) Incoming and Outgoing Passenger Cards. Statistics on overseas arrivals and departures relate to the number of movements of travellers, rather than the number of travellers (i.e. the multiple movements of individual persons during a given reference period are all counted).

Overseas arrivals and departures are classified according to length of stay on passenger cards. There are three main categories: Permanent, Long-term and Short-term arrivals and departures. Short-term arrivals and departures are defined as overseas visitors whose intended stay in Australia is less than 12 months; and Australian residents returning after an absence of less than 12 months overseas.

The ABS has undertaken a rebuild of its OAD system in 2013. The primary aim of the rebuild was to improve the quality of OAD data given its importance as an input to a broad range of statistical indicators.

The ABS revised the OAD data back to July 2004 in January 2014. Nearly all of the OAD data has changes to some degree. A time series break now exists in the OAD data from July 2004.

For more information on the changes to ABS OAD data please refer to the ABS publication <u>Overseas Arrivals and Departures</u>, <u>Australia</u>, <u>Jan 2014</u> (ABS catalogue 3401.0).

#### **Tourism Satellite Account**

A satellite account provides an expansion of Australia's national accounts for a selected area of interest, in this case tourism. The Tourism Satellite Account (TSA) provides a means by which the economic aspects of tourism (including cross border activity) can be analysed separately from the main national accounts

The concepts used in Australia's TSA are based on international standards set out in the United Nations World Tourism Organization – *The Tourism Satellite Account Recommended Methodological Framework* 2008.

The term 'tourism' in these international standards is not restricted to leisure activity. It also includes travel for business, education and other reasons. The central statistical entity in these tourism statistics is the 'visitor'. The standards define a visitor as a traveller taking a trip to a destination outside their usual environment for less than one year for any purpose other than to be employed by the resident country or place visited.

#### Direct and indirect economic impacts

Key tourism supply measures such as direct tourism GDP and direct tourism employment in this publication relate to the direct impact of tourism only. A direct impact occurs where there is a direct relationship (physical and economic) between the visitor and producer of a good or services.

In the case of goods purchased by visitors, only the retail margin contributes to key tourism supply measures. This is because it is deemed that only the retailer has a direct relationship with the visitor and is therefore part of the tourism industry. The implication of this treatment is that the value added generated in the chain of supply of goods to visitors up to, but not including, the retail level will be treated as an 'indirect effect' of tourism consumption, while only the value added generated from retail trade activities provided to visitors will be considered as a direct effect.

Indirect effects of tourism consumption is a broader notion that includes downstream effects of tourism demand and is out of scope for the Australian TSA. For example, when a visitor buys a meal, indirect effects are generated for the food manufacturer, the transporter, the electricity company, etc., that provide the necessary inputs required to make the meal. To fully measure the indirect effects, account should also be taken of changes in incomes which may feed through to further changes in tourism demand. A full analysis of indirect effects is best done using economic modelling. Tourism Research Australia (TRA) have undertaken this work and their latest results are reported in the "Tourism's Contribution to the Australian Economy 1997-1998 to 2012-13".

#### **International Visitors Survey**

International Visitors Survey (IVS) is compiled by Tourism Research Australia (TRA). The IVS is a sample survey of around 30,000 short-term foreign travellers. Only expenditure of foreign travellers who are 15 years or older is included in the survey. A great deal of additional data is available from this survey. For a starting point refer to the TRA quarterly publication, *International Visitors in Australia*.

TRA applied the revised OAD data (see the section on OAD above) to the IVS in the December quarter 2013 publication. This led to substantial downward revisions for business travel, and for arrivals from the Middle East, Singapore, Malaysia, Hong Kong and Thailand.

#### Student visa data

The student visa data in *Tables 62 and 63* is sourced from the Department of Immigration and Border Protection (DIBP) Student visa program. Student visa data also includes accompanying family members. Students from New Zealand are not captured in this data as they do not require a student visa to study in Australia. DIBP produces a regular quarterly publication on the student visa program which is available from their website.

#### Information and communication technology

The Information and communication technology (ICT) trade statistics in Section 8 are compiled from the OECD definition of ICT statistics published in 2007. More details on Australia's ICT sector can be found in the ABS publication *Information and Communication Technology*, *Australia* (catalogue 8126.0).

#### **Direct investment**

Direct investment is investment undertaken by an entity resident in one economy in an enterprise in another economy. A direct investor has a significant influence on the management of the direct investment enterprise. In ABS international investment statistics, a direct investment occurs when a direct investor owns 10 per cent or more of the ordinary shares or voting power (for an incorporated enterprise) or the similar equivalent (for an unincorporated enterprise).

#### International investment position (stock or level)

The International Investment Position (IIP) is the balance sheet recording Australia's level (also called stock, or position) of foreign financial assets and liabilities at a particular date. In this publication this is at 31 December for each year.

#### Income on investment position

Investment income refers to the income accruing on the stock of financial assets and liabilities (level or stock) during a particular period.

Investment income credits (income earned) refer to income accruing to Australian residents from the provision of financial capital to non-residents. Investment income debits (income payable) refer to income accruing to non-residents from the provision of financial capital to Australian residents.

#### Industry classification of investment

Refer to Industry classification note under Classifications section above.

For more information concerning the definitions and classification used by the ABS in the compilation of its international investment statistics, please refer to the ABS publication: *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia, Concepts Sources and Methods 1998* (catalogue 5331.0).

#### Confidentiality

To avoid divulging commercially-sensitive details of individual firms, the ABS restricts release of statistics on certain services activities.

The ABS uses perturbation to confidentialise trade in services statistics. Using the perturbation methodology, the data will be perturbed, that is, have noise added to protect the confidential cells. For example, if a cell was deemed to be confidential the ABS would subtract a small amount from another cell or cells, to add to the confidential cell, to ensure that confidentiality was not breached. In most cases the level of perturbation is not significant and should have minimal impact on the analysis of trade in services data.

However, for *Transport services* the perturbation methodology could not be applied due to the small number of businesses in this sector. As a result only a limited number of series can be published.

#### Trend growth

Trend growth rates have been derived by log-linear regression using the least squares method. This provides a more robust method than average compound annual growth as it takes into account all observations in the period and is less likely to be affected by unusually high or low values at the end points of the period.

#### Total trade

Total trade is the sum of exports and imports. This is a useful measurement of the overall trading relationship between Australia and its trading partners. Total trade data is useful in ranking Australia's major trading partners, without a bias towards ranking only the larger export markets, or the larger import sources.

## Appendix B Defining services trade

Services trade has routinely been defined within a Balance of Payments (BOP) framework and covered only transactions in services between residents and non-residents. Services trade, when defined in this way, can be broken down by the type of activity to include *Transport*; *Travel*; *Construction*; *Insurance*; *Financial*; *Telecommunication*, *computer & information*; *Charges for intellectual property*; *Business*; *Personal*, *cultural & recreational*, and *Government* services. The ABS reports services trade on this basis as part of its BOP statistics. In practice, services trade defined in this way can involve some transactions in goods (for example, where an international visitor purchases goods in the country to which he or she travels).

Wider definitions encompassing international services trade are also in use and are being reflected increasingly in analyses of international delivery of services. The framework, used in the World Trade Organization (WTO) General Agreement on Trade in Services (GATS) thus identifies, for negotiating purposes, four modes of supply through which services can be traded. These are:

#### Mode 1 - cross-border supply.

Services are delivered from the territory of one Member into the territory of another Member. The service supplier and consumer generally do not meet. For example: a consultant located in country A provides advice to a client in country B by email, fax or phone.

#### Mode 2 - consumption abroad.

Services are delivered in the territory of one Member to the consumer of any other Member. It is the consumer who travels abroad to consume the service. For example, nationals of country A travel abroad as tourists, students or patients to consume services overseas.

#### Mode 3 - commercial presence.

Services are delivered by a service supplier of one Member, through commercial presence in the territory of another Member. For example, an insurance company in country A establishes a branch or office in country B.

#### Mode 4 – presence of natural persons.

Services are delivered by the movement of a service supplier as a natural person from the territory of one Member into the territory of any other Member. This mode covers natural persons who are themselves service suppliers as well as natural persons who are employees of services suppliers. In this mode, it is the individual service supplier who travels abroad to deliver the service. Mode 4 covers only temporary entry and stay of service providers. For example, an IT consultant from country A travels to country B to fulfil a contract.

Modes 1 and 2, and parts of mode 4, are captured as services exports and imports in BOP statistics. Mode 3, however, is not recorded in this way. However, profits from affiliates operating abroad are recorded in the income account of the BOP. Parts of Mode 4, relating to some compensation of employees providing services abroad, are also included in the income account<sup>a</sup>.

In collecting statistical data on trade in services by modes of supply all countries (not just WTO members) would be included. A number of statistical agencies, including the ABS, are increasingly seeking to identify and measure transactions arising from commercial presence abroad, as well as other transactions within the GATS framework.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>a</sup> In Australia's BOP statistics, if a person remains an Australian resident while overseas, services can be provided either (1) as an employee of an Australian business that is providing a service overseas, or (2) an employee of a non-resident business.

<sup>•</sup> In case (1), the receipts of the business would be captured by the ABS and appear as a credit under trade in services in the BOP. (The wage or salary cost component of the service paid to a person providing the service is a resident to resident transaction and out of scope of BOP. This includes the case where the individual is a consultant providing the service as a business.)

<sup>•</sup> If the employee is working for a non-resident business (case 2), the salary paid to the person is captured as an income credit under 'compensation of employees' in the current account (and nothing is recorded under trade in services).

If, however, a person is overseas for more than a year, he/she becomes a non-resident. Case (1) would appear as a debit under compensation of employees in the current account (as well as the credit for trade in services) while case (2) would be out of scope of BOP statistics.
